David, (2010) discussed about Anita Desai and analyzed into consideration as most distinguished novelists related to Indian English literature. It is noted that she is unique and different in comparison to other women writers related to Indian writing for English with her perception & unique style. In study, major writers like, Kamala Mark Andaya, Ruth Jhabvala, Attica Hossain and Nayantara Sahgal write about the contemporary socio-political scene with a style which serves to highlight problems of major characters. Desai had used to emerge in terms of very serious, committed, promising as well as skilled novelist in India, as the entire contemporary Indian novelists. She really deserves, compels and invites plenty of critical attention. Anita Desai is an artist. Her works are independent. The artist Anita Desai, in no way interferes with her novels. But being a woman and a creative writer, she has some special qualities to comprehend the world. But Anita Desai refuses to be straight jacketed into any brand which includes the role of feminism. A feminine style is not to be confused with feminist that is associated with 'flowery style, trivial themes and a frivolous tone'. Her view related to skill of writing is better exemplified in the following quotation: "Writing has become such a deeply ingrained habit. For her it is like chain smoking. She admits that she chain-smokes with words, with books" (Ralph, 94). The novel of Desai revealed contained the uniqueness in the view of globe, as well as at exact period of time conform to existing tendencies into world of modern fiction.

### 3. Multicultural Aspects Within The Novels of Both Writers

As a philosophy, it began as an area of the pragmatist movement at the highest of the 19th century in Europe and within the US and later took the shape of political and cultural pluralism at the turn of the 20th century. It had been primarily in response to the large immigration to the US. Historians and sociologists like Charles Sanders Peirce, James, George Santayana, Horace Kallen, Dewey, W. E. B. Du Bois and Alain Locke developed concepts of cultural pluralism. It has been celebrated within the West as a gateway to liberal epoch, a permissive modal vehicle ideal for not only the sustenance but also for the encouragement of social heterogeneity. It becomes

this ideology to freely express one's culture and core values while honouring the others.

The most commonly accepted thing among the 2 novelists is that both were born of a mixed percentage i.e. one is to Bengali father and Germany mother and therefore the other to shine Jew and German Jew. Both married to the Indian husbands and have become Indian not by birth but by marriage. They grew and mentioned educated in almost an equivalent atmospheres, background and cultures. the 2 wrote on Indian culture, Western culture , Bengali culture, German and Polish culture. they're more keen on multicultural and multicultural aspects in India and abroad. They also affect the immigrants' problems mostly they themselves confronted in their real lives. Anita Desai divides her time between India, Boston, Massachusetts Cambridge and England whereas Ruth Praver Jhabvala spent her youth days and motherhood days in India stayed for 1 / 4 of a century approximately and left for America.

The study confirms that, multiculturalism has turned inevitable, an inseparable a part of Globalization, it's too closely related and animated with Global culture. Infact it's expanded world over under the agies of Globalization. But intensification of contacts between cultures doesn't necessarily cause tolerance for the globalization process. consistent with Anthony Smith, an excellent sociologist, "A world of competing national cultures seeking to enhance the ranking of their states, offers the prospect of worldwide 'cultural wars', with little basis for global projects of cultural integration, lingua frances and ecumenical or cosmopolitan 'unity through diversity' notions, despite the existence of the required technical communication infrastructures".

In short, there is a touch hope of a unified global culture, rather, there are global cultures within the plural. Yet, the intensity and rapidity of today's global cultural flows have contributed to the sense that, the earth could also be a singular place which involves during variety of latest cultural forms for encounters, while this increasingly dense web of cosmopolitan - local encounters and interdependences can produce to 3rd cultures and increasing tolerance. It can also end in negative reactions and intolerance.

Many post-independence novelists endeavour to explore the theme of encounter between the East and thus the West. The theme has been explored in Kamala Markandaya's *Possession* (1963), Balchandra Rajan's *The Dark Dances* (1959), Ruth Praver Jhabvala's *Esmond in India* (1958), and *heat and dirt* (1975), Santa Rama Rao's *Remember the House*

(1956), Nayantara Sahgal's *Bye Bye Blackbird* (1978). Growing cultural interaction between the East and thus the before the West and therefore the consequently changing social ethos has given another impetus to the writing of novels on the theme of East -West confrontation.

The East- West encounter in its divergence is that the essence of Ruth Praver Jhabvala's writing. Living in her adopted country along side her innate beliefs, she realizes the difficulties and impossibilities of a whole absorption. Her experience of living in India has exposed her to the Indian community and thus the expatriates living in India. it's brought her into contact with people of another culture. it is the interaction between the two cultures that she transforms into art. The results of this experience is obvious in her works and this provides her with the staple for all her fictional works. In an autobiographical essay published within the London magazine, she writes: "I have lived in India for several of my adult life. My husband is Indian. I'm not and fewer so every year; However, i want to admit that I'm not interested by India. What I'm interested by now's myself in India".

#### 4. Conclusion

Anita Desai and Ruth Praver Jhabvala have both contributed essentially to the artistic world particularly to Indian writing in English by contributing their works with a multicultural point of view that extends and develops the wildernesses of thought and which is in this way, viewed as a significant abstract trademark by most pundits and scholars is apparent from the expressions of Noble Laureate Derek Walcott: "To have adored one skyline is insularity, it blindfolds vision, it limits understanding".

Ruth Praver Jhabvala supported a deep-rooted artistic desire which prospered when she increased a section into Indian life as the companion of a Parsi modeler. In her underlying books, especially in *to morn She Will* (1955) and *The Nature of Parsion* (1956), she was severe of India like an outsider, yet she had all the earmarks of being an insider, in that she was inner with Indian genuine components and appreciative. *Warmth and Dust* (1995) marks her bewilderment both with India and with more than India, recommending the new direction and emphases of her later books (which travel through time similarly as space and in which the Western mind involves a greater amount of her consideration) and utilizing an inventive, radical take-off in story strategy.

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
